Intro. Forensic Science - Reading Assignment

Date	Period

Task: Select either an **informational text** (a.k.a. nonfiction) or a **literary text** (formerly known as fiction) that either has forensic science as the main theme or as a background theme.

Purpose: This assignment is designed to provide students an opportunity to use their forensic science knowledge to analyze a text.

Supporting one or more of the following: Common Core Learning Standards – Literacy

- 1. Cite specific textual evidence to support analysis of science and technical texts, attending to important distinctions the author makes and to any gaps or inconsistencies in the account.
- 2. Determine central ideas or themes of a text and analyze their development; summarize the key supporting details and ideas.
- 3. Analyze how and why individuals, events, or ideas develop and interact over the course of a text.
- 6. Assess how point of view or purpose shapes the content and style of a text.
- 8. Delineate and evaluate the argument and specific claims in a text, including the validity of the reasoning as well as the relevance and sufficiency of the evidence.

Book Tasting - Students will:

- 'taste' a variety of books, both fiction and nonfiction, that either have forensic science as the main focus of the book or as a background theme.
- complete a *Book* Tasting summary sheet, recording information from 4 6 books, rating the books.
- choose a book from the many offerings available in the AHS library or online and will check the book out of the library.

Reading Response Journal Entries/Logs – Students will:

- complete TWO journal entries using the following guidelines/writing prompts:
 - o non-fiction
 - Write to inform us about the author. What other articles and/or books has the author written? Is he/she one of your favorite authors, and if so, why?
 - Explain the basic information that is being presented in terms of the 5W's: Who? What? When? Where? Why?
 - What forensic science techniques does the text focus on?
 - Make a connection between the techniques presented in the text and the techniques you have learned in class. Does the text present real—world examples of the techniques you've learned in class? If yes, describe these techniques and their applications in the text.
 - Explain some of the techniques or information that is new to you.
 - Cite a short passage of text that you found interesting and explain what made it interesting.
 - Many forensic storylines elicit a strong emotional response from the reader. Describe whether the text had this type of an impact on you. Quote a short section of the text specific to those feelings.

- Provide a brief description of the main characters to include age, gender, name, and key characteristics.
- Provide a brief description of the plot.
- Think about the author's craft (decisions the author made and perhaps why they were made).
- From a forensic science standpoint how does the author provide information or details to make the story seem realistic?
- Cite important passages and descriptions that stick with you.
- Record your observations of the use of forensics in the text. Is it used as the main story line or rather as a background, supporting story.
- Many forensic storylines elicit a strong emotional response from the reader. Describe whether the text had this type of an impact on you. Quote a short section of the text specific to those feelings.
